Why do we evaluate NRNs?



Requirements

The NRNs are supported by the EAFRD

They must be evaluated as any other intervention of rural development policy (relevance, effectiveness, efficiency and sustainability in using the public finances)

Benefits

Intervention logic of NRN addresses specific needs and challenges of rural areas

Evaluation helps:

- Answer if objectives are met
- Improve interventions

What do we evaluate?

*NRN as **defined** by the RD Regulation, Art. 55:*

“Each Member State shall establish a national rural network, which groups the organisations and administrations involved in rural development”.

Other definitions?

e.g.: set of actors (organisations, groups, individuals) connected by links and/or relations [Roelofs]

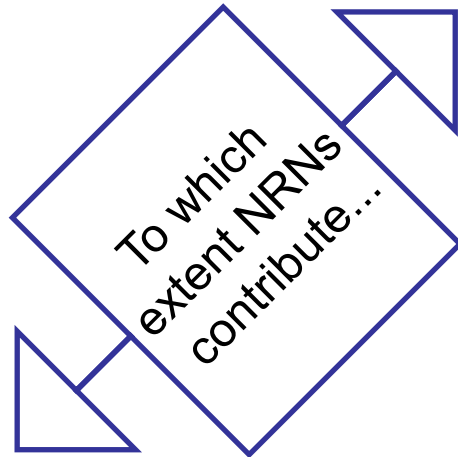
Purpose: *To create added value for their members*

What do we evaluate?

Specific interventions of NRN 2014 – 2020 shall cover the *relations among actors* and the *added value of the NRN*, materialised via activities at:

- **micro-level**, - it is about individuals
- **meso-level** - it is about organisations
- **macro-level** - it is about the governance

Cornerstones of intervention logic of National Rural Networks



CAP horizontal and specific objectives (macro level)

Governance in rural areas

(macro level):

- ✓ Networking
- ✓ Involvement of stakeholders
- ✓ Partnership building
- ✓ Sustainable utilisation of resources..

Do NRNs use what is in...

RD Regulation proposal, Art. 55 (meso and micro level)

RD Regulation, Art. 55

...allocated **budgets of RDP for NRN** shall be used to finance:

DELIVERY PART

Structures needed to run the network

The setting up of **pre-selection board** of independent experts and **the process of pre-selection of applications for the prize** for innovative local co-operation

INTERVENTION PART

Aims for networking (meso level)

Preparation and implementation of **the action plan** (micro level)

Observations from MTE of NRNP

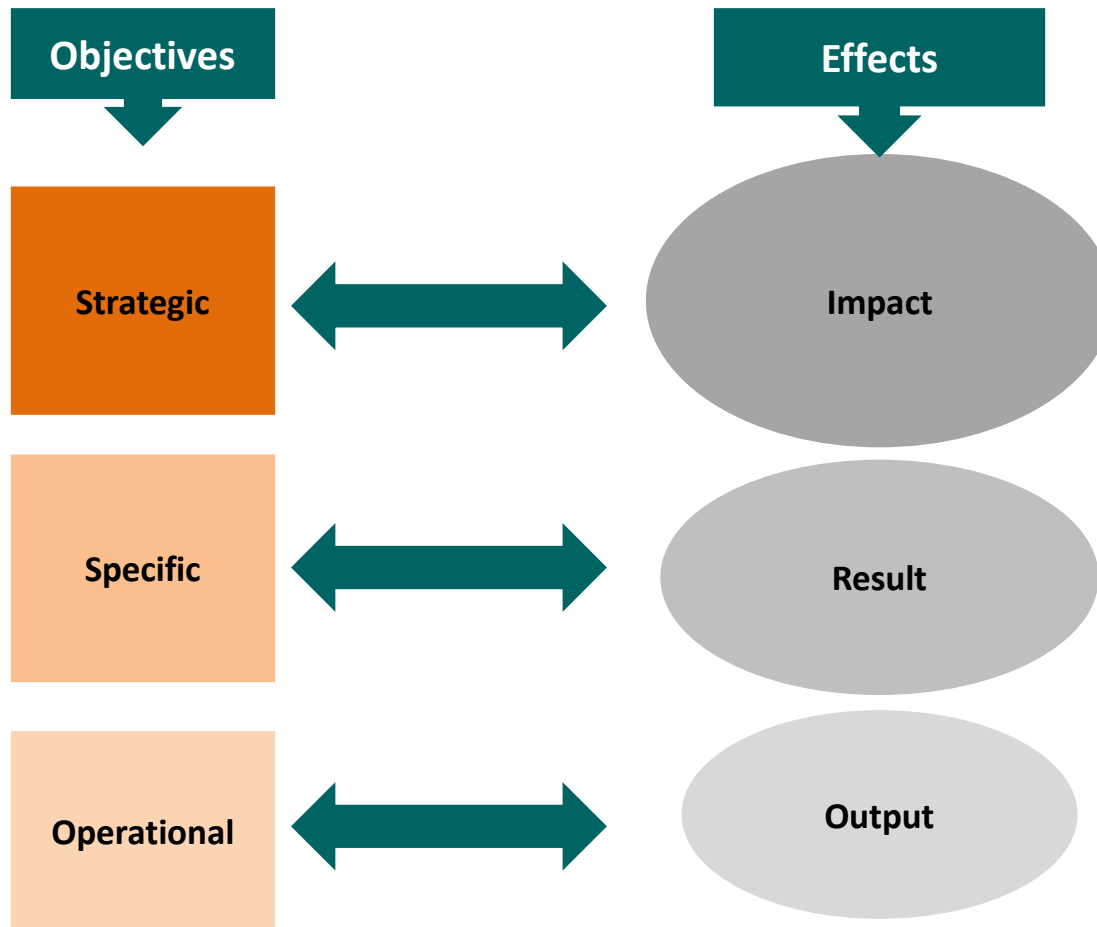
- The **intervention logics** of NRNP were sometimes **incomplete and inconsistent**.
 - Rather vague **formulation of objectives** and **definition of indicators**.
 - **Methodological difficulties in capturing impacts**, especially those linked to the governance in rural areas.
 - Little use of **advanced methodologies**, data and reliable baselines to measure the network effects.
 - **No guidance** on evaluation of NRNP available.
- **Assessment of outputs** but few information about results and impacts
- We know **how much** we achieved (outputs), but not **what CHANGE** was induced by the network activities (results & impacts)!

Why do we need an intervention logic?

The intervention logic is a tool for **constructing**, **visualising** and **communicating** the approach of an intervention as well as for **assessing** its achievements.

- Each NRN operates in a **different** environment and governance setting and addresses a variety of needs.
 - the **approach** of each NRN is unique
 - The NRN intervention logic must properly reflect this
(→ **basic need for a good evaluation**)

Constructing the intervention logic of the NRN



What we do and don't have for IL of NRN 2014-2020

We have:

- ***Macro level*** – CAP horizontal and specific objectives
- ***Meso level*** – aims of networking
- ***Micro level*** - Indicative activities for an action plan

We don't have:

- ***Macro/meso level*** – governance context

Key challenges in evaluation of NRN interventions



Content

- ❖ The quality of intervention logic
- ❖ The evaluation framework including proper evaluation questions and indicators,
- ❖ Selection of appropriate methods
- ❖ Data collection and management
- ❖ Evidence based judgments

Process

- Steer the evaluation from the start
- Select good evaluator
- Involve all important stakeholders and data providers into the process
- Build up evaluation capacity and culture
- Introduce self-assessment practice

Criteria for evidence based evaluation of NRN

- High quality **intervention logic**
- Well designed **evaluation framework**
- Effective and efficient **steering and managing** the evaluation

Ex ante check of intervention logic

- Are the **needs** relevant and properly addressed?
- Do the **objectives** reflect specific needs at each level of the IL and are they formulated in SMART way (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, timely) at each hierarchy level (operational, specific, overall)?
- Are the **terms** used in the objectives well defined (→ link to definition of indicators)?
- Are the **expected effects** well articulated at impact, result and output level?

Ex ante check of evaluation framework

- Are the **evaluation questions** consistent with the objectives?
- Are the **indicators** for each level of intervention (output, result, impact) consistent with the objectives and evaluation questions?
- Are the foreseen **evaluation methods sound**?
- Is **data collection** system and management workable?

Ex ante check of evaluation steering

- Is an evaluation **management structure established**?
- Is the **scope of evaluation well defined**?
- Has evaluation been prepared and a **the steering group set up**?
- Are there provision for **evaluation during the programming period**?
- **Are there provisions that evaluation results are used**, feedback provided and followed up?
