

The 12th NRNs' meeting – co-organised with the Estonian Rural Network support unit – brought together over 50 participants from 18 Member States, representing 21 rural networks.

The event aimed to actively involve the NRNs in specific ENRD work strands:

- Contributing to the design and re-definition of contents of the Networking pages of the ENRD Website to meet NRN needs, with a focus on the NRN Toolkit;
- Involving the NRNs at the early planning stage of the upcoming Spring 2019 Rural Networking Conference;
- Increasing involvement of NRNs in the upcoming thematic work on Bioeconomy.

Meeting Highlights



The 12th NRN Meeting started with three parallel travelling workshops on the 17th September organised by the Estonian NRN. During the travelling workshops participants visited various EAFRD-funded project examples that were clustered around three topics: circular economy, renewable energy and bioeconomy. These examples included an ecologically renovated old [windmill](#), [solar panels](#) on a strawberry farm and a [cheese and ice-cream producer](#). Alongside the project visits, relevant activities related to Bioeconomy were presented by the [Finnish](#), [Swedish](#) and [Polish](#) NSUs.

Participants were invited to attend a gala evening showcasing 'Rural Development in Estonia - 100 projects for 100 years', celebrating 100 years of the country's independence. Active contributors to the gala were the people delivering those projects, while posters illustrated project successes and outcomes. This constituted a 'grand finale' to the two days.

There can be more updates on NRNs' activities and contacts and improvements in the way these updates are highlighted or communicated (e.g. via the homepage). to make a series of "how to" from successful examples of event organisation, communication activities, etc, shared by the NSU itself for other NSUs to pick up and replicate the practice.

Ideas for contributing on content

- ✓ NRNs could help define what the list of users' interests should be by submitting potential topics of interest through an online survey
- ✓ Directly uploading practical examples on how to better perform the NRN tasks in a simplified format (needs, challenges, methodology) and directly updating NSUs contacts to facilitate peer-to-peer exchanges
- ✓ Communicating more news and events from the NSU level
- ✓ Contribute to a 'project of the week/month' competition (through a quick and easy voting system) to make the website more interactive

Ideas for contributing via more exchanges/interactions

- ✓ Promotion of the ENRD website
- ✓ More interaction on the website – functionality needed to do so
- ✓ 'Talking heads'-style videos from NRN colleagues promoting best practice examples to be used as guidance for other NRNs
- ✓ NRNs in each country should have their own responsibility for updating their profile
- ✓ Provide news and updated information for the ENRD website on a regular basis, including NRN thematic priorities and LEADER/CLLD-related priorities



NRNs at work: getting ready for the Spring 2019 Networking Event

The meeting was also an opportunity to start involving NRNs in the upcoming **Rural Networking Conference being organised by the ENRD on 11-12 April 2019 in Brussels**. Three groups provided insight and ideas on three aspects of the event: the Conference/Plenary session, the Workshops and the Market place. The discussions were deliberately unconstrained and generated a real 'brainstorming'.

The group focusing on the **Conference** suggested that the purpose of the Plenary session be to show the added value of networking, looking at the past 10 years experiences to reflect on how networking can be supported in the future CAP. The outcome of the conference should be a better sense of the direction we are going towards. Successes of previous activities can be shared through video clips and include cases such as the Baltic-Nordic network. The conference should make the case for seizing existing opportunities and looking at new ways of working with stakeholders through the future CAP.

The group focusing on the **Workshops** element of the conference identified some key topics around which workshops could be constructed. These included rural youth/generational renewal, innovation and environment, smart villages and supply chains. A workshop could also focus on the communication activities of rural networks. The overarching approach to any individual topic would be the impact and added value of rural

networking in advancing the topic. NRNs could contribute to define the target audience of the workshops, but the group underlined that the main audience should be national MAs and policy makers who may need to be convinced of the utility of a future CAP network in the post-2020 context.

Three groups brainstormed on a possible **Market place**. This should be a venue to share information on what the NRNs do and to showcase the evolution of networking. The Market place should bring different stakeholders together, let them speak to each other and explain the results and value of networking from their own perspective. The ideal outcome for this activity would be that participants will contact the NSUs after the conference to find out more about the solutions they have shared. In terms of how to deliver the market place, the message was “People, not brochures!”.

Launch of the ENRD Thematic Group on Bioeconomy

The [ENRD Thematic Group \(TG\) on Bioeconomy](#) will start on 9 October with a first meeting to discuss the initial scoping work carried out by the ENRD Contact Point and to define and agree on objectives, priority issues, methodologies of the TG analytical work and the related communication activities. In order to involve NRNs into the TG work some 'food for thought' was presented to the NRNs at the meeting.



Mr Alberto D'Avino (DG AGRI) presented the work on Bioeconomy carried out by the EIP-AGRI Service Point. '*Strengthening agricultural value chains within a circular, decarbonised bio-economy*' is one of three EIP AGRI priorities for 2018. Under this priority, the Service Point will organise one workshop and two focus groups: the first one looks into "[New feed for pigs and poultry](#)", the second one on "[Reducing food loss on the farm](#)".

The work of the ENRD TG will benefit from the thematic work of the EIP-AGRI, ensuring close coordination. In particular, while EIP-AGRI has a strong focus on the primary production, the ENRD TG will look at the opportunities offered by bio-based business models for the rural economy, through the lens of the whole value chain, and how RDP measures can support the implementation of national bioeconomy strategies.

Keynote speech on Eco-communities in Europe

Prof. Toomas Trapido (Gaia Academy), the Estonian keynote speaker, gave insights into [the concept of eco-communities](#) and their potential contribution to the Bioeconomy for rural areas. An eco-community can be defined as "*an intentional, traditional or urban community that is consciously designed through locally owned participatory processes in all four dimensions of sustainability (social, culture, ecology and economy) to regenerate social and natural environments*".

Mr Trapido presented a series of examples of eco-communities in Europe, some dating back to the beginning of the '60s.

Outcomes and Actions

The event was a good opportunity to reinforce links between NRNs and with the ENRD CP. Information on RDPs is developing and NRNs were encouraged to build on previously identified successes in their exchanges. The Contact Point received plenty of ideas for improving the NRN toolkit, including the usefulness of sharing methodologies rather than only good practices. The ENRD CP will take stock of these valuable inputs, which will contribute to the re-definition and re-design of structure and content of the Networking pages of the ENRD Website. A key conclusion was the need to consider and understand the future of networking in the next CAP programming period.
