The role of young farmers' organisations in agricultural policy and rural area development



Main issues and challenges identified

The discussion focused solely on young farmers' organisations and in particular how to setup such organisations and what the objective should be.

The main issue identified was the absence in some countries, (e.g. Cyprus) of active and well-structured young farmers' organisations.

Main obstacles identified

The main obstacles identified to the setting up and functioning of young farmers' organisations were:

- ✓ Strong political influence can often represent an obstacle to the creation of an organisation and to its capacity to represent all young farmers.
- ✓ Lack of financial resources also represents an important obstacle to the setting up of an organisation and of course to its capacity to work.
- ✓ Lack of human resources is also identified as an obstacle to the effectiveness of an organisation's activity; at least one full-time person should be employed to run the organisation and take care of the contacts with members.

Lessons learnt

- ✓ The presence of a young farmers' organisation at national level is important in terms of support and representation for young farmers.
- ✓ Adequate financial support is needed to set up and run organisation for young farmers.
- ✓ Adequate human resources are important, in particular a motivated and strong leader is considered key to launching and running such an organisation.



Possible actions

- ✓ Find the umbrella organisation for young farmers' organisations.
- ✓ It is necessary to inform and involve young people using different measures and communications channels.
- ✓ International cooperation and the sharing of experience is important in setting-up an organisation for young farmers, especially for those countries that do not yet have experience in this field.
