Why Transnational Cooperation?

- Similar geographical features across border
- River catchments and landscapes do not always conform to administrative boundaries
- Similar climate change predictions across whole area
- Land management communities have links across the border

Cheviot Futures Outcomes

- A network of demonstration projects covering a wide range of climate change issues
 - Informing policy negotiations on agri-environment schemes
 - Initiating broader activity on flood management
- Private sector engagement is a core part of project delivery
- Model way of innovative partnership working

Cheviot Futures Outcomes (2)

- Skills transfer by using land managers and local contractors
- Links to broader projects across the EU
 - Wildfire simulation exercise
- Community resilience
- Direct benefits to the local economy and local universities
