

Examples of expected achievements

- The RDP will support 130 cooperation projects (including projects under the European Innovation Partnership EIP) and about 36 000 places for farmers and foresters in training activities.
- The programme will fund investments in physical assets (concerning 2 500 farms) and farm and business development (supporting establishment of young farmers and diversification into non-agricultural activities, such as rural tourism and production of renewable energy).
- The promotion of quality products and the participation of farmers in quality schemes will be supported by the RDP. In addition, the programme will support investments in the processing and marketing of agricultural products (which will affect 190 agro-industrial companies) as well as the development of short supply chains and local markets.
- The RDP will provide support for actions to prevent and repair damage caused by natural disasters, and in particular investments for the prevention of damage caused by vine's flavescence dorée and other serious biotic adversities. Nearly 20 % of agricultural land will be under agro-environment-climate contracts and 12 000 ha will be supported on organic farming.
- Aiming at reducing GHG and ammonia emissions, the RDP includes investments in animal husbandry, improving the efficiency of irrigation systems (on around 1% of the irrigated land); afforestation; agro-environment-climate contracts; support cooperation actions for the sustainable supply of forest biomass used for energy production and for industrial processes.
- Around EUR 45 million will be devoted to the installation of ultra-broadband infrastructure in order to cover 10 % more of the rural population. Local Development Strategies (LDS) will be supported to cover almost half of rural population and to create 60 additional jobs.

Examples of key challenges

- A major challenge in terms of competitiveness of agriculture faced by the Piemonte is represented by the pursuit of a higher degree of efficiency either through increasing farm size or through cooperation between farms.
- Nitrate pollution impacts significantly on natural resources the respective areas. Waters are also under stress by the use of pesticides and the extraction of water for agricultural use. Another challenge is reversing the trend of marginalisation of mountain areas, including the digital divide.


P1 - Knowledge transfer & innovation: Fostering knowledge transfer and innovation in agriculture, forestry, and rural areas





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

3. Planned expenditure per priority



Priority 1 is considered to be cross-cutting and no separate financial allocation is shown as the expenditure is distributed across other focus areas. Expenditure under Priority 4 is programmed for the priority as a whole, not for individual focus areas.
